### FAMILY LIFE AMID GLOBAL CONFUSION TOPIC OF NEXT ATWOOD LECTURE

Teaching children values has never been easy, but the modern world proves an increasing challenge to parents who want to instill a sense of goodness in their young. This dilemma forms the cornerstone of the next Atwood Lecture on February 23. Michael True, Ph.D. will discuss "Ordinary People: Family Life and Global Values" at O'Hare Academic Center at 7:30 p.m. The talk will attempt to make sense of child rearing in a nuclear age.

True teaches English at Assumption College in Worcester, Mass., and he was visiting professor of American Literature at Nanjing University, People's Republic of China from 1984-1985. He was visiting professor of Religion at Colorado College (1988), and he has published several books including Homemade Social Justice: Teaching Peace and Justice in the Family, Daniel Berrigan: Poetry, Drama, Prose and Peace Makers, Justice Seekers: 32 Portraits in Courage. He has also authored numerous magazine articles on religion and literature for Commonweal, America, National Catholic Reporter, New Republic and Harvard Divinity Bulletin.

In addition to his scholarly and literary credentials, True has first hand experience in his topic as a father of six and grandfather of three.

The Atwood Lectures are supported by a grant from Oliver S. and Jennie R. Donaldson Charitable Trust.

## PRESIDENT McKILLOP "BAILED" OUT

After an approximately one-hour confinement, Sister Lucille McKillop, president of Salve Regina College, was "bailed" out of her Newport Marriott cell by the contributions of students, staff and faculty.

Sister Lucille had been taken into custody on Friday, Jan. 27 at 3 p.m. as part of a March of Dimes "Jail and Bail" fundraising drive. Her formal charge was "subjecting impressionable young adults to the benefits of higher education without first warning them of the value thereof." She was escorted by Newport Police to the Marriott with students close in pursuit holding bail money in hand. Bail had been set at \$600, and a collection held at the College netted \$1,200 for the March of Dimes.



## SALVE REGINA COLLEGE THEATRE RECEIVES RECOGNITION FROM AMERICAN COLLEGE THEATRE FESTIVAL

Salve Regina College Theatre Department's production of "Olympus On My Mind" received sixth place in the American College Theatre Festival's twenty-first New England competition. Close to 70 productions from colleges throughout New England competed.

Cast member Christopher Moriarity (class of '89), who portrayed the fleet-footed and quick-witted Mercury, was selected as a finalist in the Festival's Irene Ryan Acting Competition which took place at the Providence Biltmore Hotel on Jan. 27 - Feb. 1. Gregory Geer (class of '89) attended the competition as Moriarity's scene partner. Geer played a chorus member named Dick in "Olympus."

The lively cast also included Robert Matteau (class of '90) as Jupiter/Amphitryon; Marjorie Santa (class of '90) as Alcemene; Robert Whitaker (class of '89); Joan Mitchell (class of '91) as chorus member Tom and Thomas McMahon (class of '90) as Horace.

"Olympus On My Mind" marked the first entry by Salve Regina College into the American Theatre competition. Bernard G. Masterson, theatre department chairman, served as artistic director for both productions, and Monique M. Lareau, a 1982 graduate of the Salve Regina theatre department, choreographed.
