WOMEN AND REPRODUCTIVE TECHNOLOGY
EXAMINED BY WOMAN CONNECTION CONFERENCE

A workshop entitled "Reproductive Technology and the Future" will take place at O'Hare Academic Center on Sat., March 4 from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The workshop is sponsored by the Woman Connection Committee.

Presenters represent the Institute on Women and Technology, a Massachusetts-based advocacy organization which works to analyze the effects of new and existing technologies on women. The institute contends that scientific and medical procedures, from birth control devices to surgery, have been designed by men and carried out by men on women without concern for women's emotional, economic or physical well-being.

Following morning presentations, a panel will challenge the featured speakers and generate audience discussion. Panelists will include Linda J. Kushner, an attorney and Rhode Island state representative; Rosalina Ekman Ladd, a philosophy instructor at Wheaton College and clinical lecturer at Brown University; and Karen Murphy, Director of the Graduate Management department at Salve Regina.

FACULTY NEWS

Sister M. Therese Antone, Vice President for Institutional Advancement has been accepted into the Massachusetts Institute For Technology (MIT) program for senior executives. Sister Therese will attend March 5 - May 5. The intensive management program includes senior executives from all over the United States as well as from international businesses and government organizations.

Limited to 50 students, the program addresses concerns of senior management executives, including world economy, rapid technological change and effective human resource management. Planned seminars integrate business principles with elements of the humanities by using Shakespeare and other classical literary sources, along with economic data, to create a humanistic and holistic base for corporate strategy, planning and management.

In addition, Sister Therese addressed the members of the District I Council for the Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) Conference held in Montreal in early February. She discussed "Strategies for Raising Corporate and Foundation Support in a Capital Campaign."

Reverend John J. Duggan, Ph.D., priest counselor for students and the College community at Salve Regina, has been elected to membership in the American Psychological Association (APA). The APA is the world's largest association of psychologists with affiliations through-out the United States and Canada.

Dr. Mary Louise Greeley, Chair of the Biology & Biomedical Sciences Department presented a talk on "Cholesterol: The Evaluation of its Nutritional Theory and Current Practice" at a luncheon for the Newport Hospital Auxiliary in honor of new auxiliary members. Dr. Greeley addressed such pertinent issues as the recent increase in the number of adults with abnormal cholesterol, current theories on reducing cholesterol, the types of fatty acids and their effects on cholesterol, and the HDL and LDL components of cholesterol and their effects on atherosclerosis and its long-term impact on health.

Jay Lacouture, Chairperson of the Art Department recently attended a conference hosted by The Getty Center for Education in the Arts in Los Angeles. The conference, "Education in Art: Future Building", was an invitational event attended by arts administrators, museum staff, art teachers, college professors and public policy makers in the arts. The Getty Center is dedicated to improving the quality and status of arts education in the nation's schools.

Patricia Reall, Salve Regina Women's Basketball Team's Center, is the second most accurate NCAA Division III shooter in the nation. She averages 16.8 points per game. Salve Regina College ranks eleventh in the nation.

Women's Basketball Ranked in Top Ten, the women's basketball team is currently the tenth ranked team in New England, according to the most recent New England Women's Basketball Association Coaches Poll. The Lady Newporters received 17 points from New England Coaches after a 4-0 start. The poll marks the first time a Salve Regina Basketball team has been included in the top ten in New England. Sherri Catizone, a sophomore majoring in Politics and who plans to attend law school, has been named a semi-finalist in the annual competition for the Harry S. Truman Foundation Scholarship.
