## FACULTY NEWS

Lois Wims, Instructor of Administration of Justice, will speak on "Domestic Violence" for the Aquidneck Island Business and Professional Women on April 11. The meeting takes place at the Comfort Inn at 7 p.m. This speaking engagement was booked because of the Speaker's Bureau here at the College and a prior engagement on the same topic last October.

Brother John Buckley, Chair, History Department, will attend the Hofstra University Conference on the Presidency of Gerald Ford at Hampstead, Long Island, on April 6, 7 and 8. The three-day meeting will consist of panels and papers by government leaders, historians, and political scientists as well as a presidential address by Gerald Ford on Friday afternoon.

Stephanie Muri, Associate Professor of Social Work, and Mary Montminy-Danna, Assistant Professor of Social Work, attended the national annual program meeting of the Council on Social Work Education in Chicago, Ill. They participated in a wide variety of formal and informal programs, ranging from "Social Work and the Liberal Arts" to "Empowering Women through Knowledge and Education."

Mary Montminy-Danna, Assistant Professor of Social Work made a formal presentation on March 9, to Delta Kappa Gamma, Iota Chapter, Newport, on "Children who Witness Domestic Violence." On March 12, she took part in a roundtable discussion on this subject at the Women in Psychology Conference at the Sheraton-Islander. She discussed the physical, social and emotional consequences of witnessing domestic violence and described an empowerment model of working with children and their mothers.

Katharine Ostrander, Chair, Social Work Department, Stephanie Muri, Associate Professor of Social Work, and senior Social Work majors recently attended the annual symposium of the Rhode Island Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers. The conference focused on "The Psychological Abuse of Children and Youth; Status and Strategies." Nationally recognized authorities presented a series of six lectures on the topic.

Dr. Jack Childs, Director of the Human Development Program, presented a workshop on self-esteem for people working with pregnant teenagers at the ninth annual School-age Pregnancy Conference sponsored by Young Parents Program of Rhode Island, Inc. His workshop, "Healing the Child Within" was geared to social workers and counselors working with teenage mothers.

Childs also served as a panelist for a discussion on a research presentation on self-esteem in teenage pregnant women, the conference keynote speech.

Dr. Beverly Serabian, Clinical Psychologist and Instructor in the Holistic Counseling Graduate Program, led a workshop at a national conference for women psychologists held in Newport recently. Members of the Association for Women in Psychology (AWP) met to discuss topics as varied as homeless women, eating disorders, sexual harassment of professional women and issues unique to black women in psychotherapy.
