COLLEGE MOURNS DEATH OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEMBER MARTIN MUNROE

Martin J. Munroe, a member of Salve Regina College's Board of Trustees since 1982, died April 10. He was a member of the Executive Committee of the Board, Chairman of the Institutional Planning Committee and had served on the Finance, Advancement and Nominating Committees. Together with his wife Rita and family, he was instrumental in the development of the new campus technology center, which was dedicated as "The Munroe Center" in their honor.

In addition to his service to the College, Martin Munroe served on the Board of Covenant House, a New York City based program which provides help and support to homeless and runaway youths. He was also associated with the Henry Street Settlement House, which honored him for his commitment to taking care of the poor and underprivileged.

The College is planning a memorial service for Martin Munroe at a date to be announced.

A series of talks by survivors and an exhibit published by the National Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith will take place on Wednesday, May 3 at 1:30 p.m. in the T.B. Room at O'Hare Academic Center. Speakers will include Lea Eliash, a survivor of the Covenant Ghettos who was freed by Christian friends, Bruno Bornstein, a child of survivors, and Heinz Sandelowski, a former underground resistance fighter. The event is open to the public and the College community. We ask that faculty encourage students to attend this commemoration held in support of the mandate of the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Council.
