Salve Regina College Conducts Ground Blessing
For The New Library In Conjunction With Fall Convocation

Salve Regina College will conduct a ground blessing ceremony to begin the process of building the new College library on Wednesday, Oct. 11 at 11:30 a.m. The ceremony will follow the College's annual fall Convocation Mass, which traditionally heralds the beginning of each academic year. Convocation begins at 10:30 a.m.

An academic procession will meet at McAuley Hall, location of the present library, and proceed toward Wakehurst Campus Center where a Mass will be celebrated under a large tent. After the celebration of Mass and a musical interlude by the Salve Regina College Chorus, Bishop Louis E. Gelineau will bless the site of the new library. A reception will be held for the College community and invited guests.



Foreign Influences On View At McKillop Gallery

Five art majors who studied abroad last year will present visual documentation of their experiences in an art exhibit entitled "Foreign Influences" in the McKillop Gallery through October 17.

Work will include mediums as diverse as photography and concrete sculpture depicting impressions of locales as varied as Italy, England, France and Africa.

Lizabeth Dion and Sue Kaminsky spent last semester in the Italian art centers of Florence and Siena. Dion will show paintings and sketches, and Kaminsky will display photography. Jason Burrell spent the academic year in Paris. He will exhibit paintings and drawings. Melissa Ablondi who studied for a semester in London, will present photography. Tom Judd will show cement sculpture and sketches highlighting his semester in Nairobi, Kenya.

Salve Regina Plans Annual Hunger Concert

The Music Department will present the 4th annual Hunger Concert on Friday, October 13 at 8 p.m. in Ochre Court. Proceeds from the musical variety show will benefit local soup kitchens and hunger relief organizations. The College jazz combo will perform contemporary tunes to the theme "Upbeat for the Downbeat."

Proceeds from previous concerts have benefitted the Salvation Army, the Martin Luther King Center and Lucy's Hearth. Last year's show aired on the local cable program "Crossed Paths."

Scholarship Grants Awarded

New Students Seminar Program

As part of the New Students Seminar Program, the Dean of Students office held a workshop on freshman elections last week.
