COMBINED CHORAL CONCERT

The Salve Regina College Chorus will present a combined concert with the Fairfield University Glee Club on Saturday, Oct. 28 at 8 p.m. in Ochre Court.

Selections will include madrigals, such as "April Is In My Mistress' Face," a medley of Broadway tunes, upbeat contemporary numbers and religious songs such as "Cantate Deo," a sacred motet.

Carole Ann Coyne-Maxwell, a Lecturer in Fine Arts at Fairfield University, Fairfield, Conn., will conduct that group's selections, and Bernice Mrozinski will provide piano accompaniment.

Brother James Loxham, Director of Applied Music at Salve Regina, will conduct combined numbers and selections sung by the Salve Regina Chorus, and William Wiant, Music Lecturer at Salve Regina, will provide piano accompaniment.

Salve Regina students will offer the Connecticut students Newport tours on Saturday. Both choral groups will sing again at a Sunday mass on the campus. Tickets cost \$2 and are available at Cecilia Hall.

NOON CONCERT SERIES PRESENTS MUSIC FROM THE ANDES

Fortaleza, A South American quartet, will play traditional and contemporary folk music at the next Salve Regina College noon concert, scheduled for Wednesday, Nov. 1. The name (Spanish for fortress) was inspired by ruins and forts left behind by the Tiahuanaco and Inca civilizations, and the group strives to keep these ancient tunes alive.

The melodies incorporate vocals with the sounds of wind instruments, guitar and drums native to the Andes Mountains and other regions in Bolivia.

Fortaleza has shared the stage with Tracy Chapman, Tom Rush and Miami Sound Machine, and a song they played appeared on the soundtrack of "Salvador." They have performed in concerts at the Statue of Liberty, Carnegie Hall, the Portland (Maine) Performing Arts Center and at museums, colleges and stadiums throughout New England. They have recorded two albums in Bolivia, and their newest album will be released in the U.S. on the Flying Fish label.
