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

SALVE REGINA COLLEGE ANNOUNCES THIRD GRANT FROM WILLIAM RANDOLPH HEARST FOUNDATION

Salve Regina College has received the third of a series of grants from the William Randolph Hearst Foundation. According to Sister M. Therese Antone, Vice President for Institutional Advancement, "This gift brings the Hearst grants to a total of \$75,000. The College has established the William Randolph Hearst Endowment for scholarship aid to minority students."

The William Randolph Hearst Foundation, founded in 1948 by publisher/philanthropist William Randolph Hearst, provides grants for social welfare, education, health care and the arts and humanities. The Foundation has stated its chief priority as funding programs which aid poverty and minority groups.

The Hearst Foundation bestowed an initial grant to the College in 1986 at which time the Salve Regina College commitment to quality education received the praise of foundation executives, Sister Therese added.

Dr. Arthur Krim, Assistant Professor of Geography, recently hosted a meeting of the Eastern Historical Geography Association (EHGA) at the College. Approximately 50 members attended, representing Clarke University in Worcester, Mass., Pennsylvania State University, the Universities of Wisconsin, Chicago, Maryland and Delaware, and York University in Toronto. Dr. Krim presented a brief slide show and a talk entitled "Colonial Newport: Image and Reality." Elliott Caldwell, curator at the Newport Historical Society, also spoke briefly about the city. Members later took a tour of Newport. The EHGA is studying Colonial towns in the Narragansett Bay area.

Donald St. Jean, Instructor in the Music Department, will perform the leading tenor role in "Five Needles, White Pine," an opera by Rhode Island composer Geoffrey Gibbs. 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Dr. Michael Thombs, Assistant Professor of Information Systems Science, had an article, "Busy Professionals Go To Class the MODEM Way," accepted by Educational Journal. The article was co-authored by Mrs. Beverly Alcott, West Germany, and Mrs. Patricia Saile, Florida. All writing, sharing and editing was done through TYMNET International Network. The authors discuss the impact of telecommunications on the future of education.

Three Salve Regina College professors made presentations at the 1989 Professional Issues Conference sponsored by the Federation of Nurses and Health Professionals. The purpose of the Conference, held at the Sheraton Islander in Newport on Sept. 13, was for nursing personnel to

explore future issues in their field.

Dr. Catherine Graziano, Professor of Nursing, presented "Alternatives in Care." Dr. Graziano discussed how the delivery of health care will change by the year 2000. Health care staffing will include more extensive use of computers and robotics, she said. Along with an increased amount of decision making for nurses, there are ethical dilemmas which nurses believe must be clarified. Dr. Macrina Hawkins, and Joan Chapdelaine, both Associate Professors of Nursing, explored "Ethical Crises in Health Care." Some ethical issues included when a living will should be used.

Dr. Catherine E. Graziano, Professor of Nursing, has been awarded the Nurse Educator Recognition Award by the Rhode Island State Nurses' Association on Oct. 20. Dr. Graziano is the first recipient of the award. Dr. Graziano was also elected to a two-year term as a member of the Board of Directors for the Rhode Island State Nurses' Association. On Nov. 10, Dr. Graziano will participate in a panel discussion, "Survival in the 1990's," a program sponsored by Sigma Theta Tau, the National Nursing Honor Society, Delta Epsilon Chapter, at the Inn at the Crossing in Warwick.
