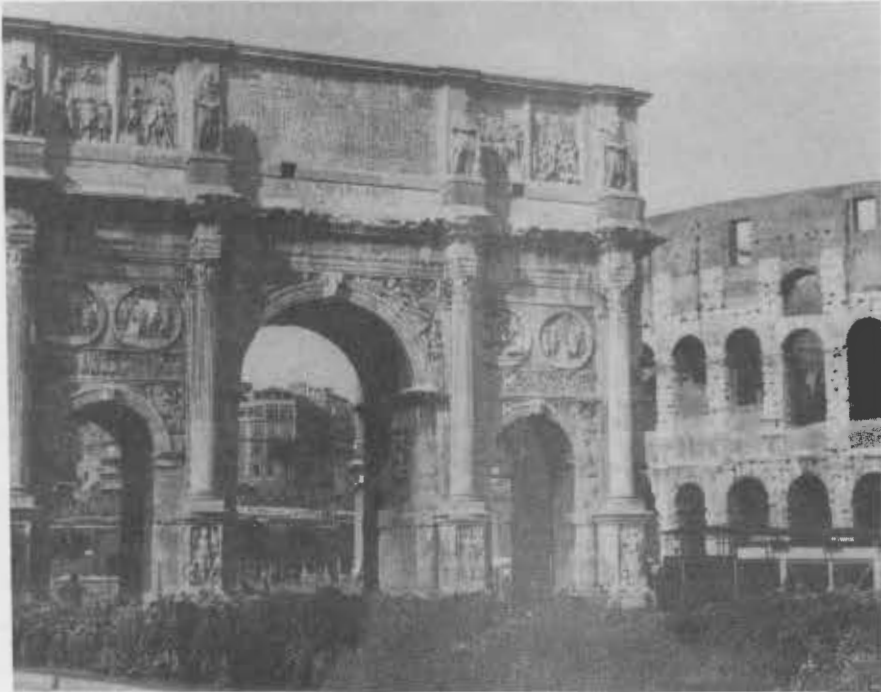

Study Abroad Programs Blossom

Following the success of the African Studies Program, Salve Regina College has added a European Studies Program based in Ireland to the curriculum. Students at the College also have the opportunity to study in Italy, France, England, Austria, Spain and Switzerland.

Eleven students went to Kenya last spring. In addition to doing classroom work in African history, geography, literature and politics, they climbed Mt. Longanout and traveled to a game reserve. Art major Thomas Judd commented that his favorite part of the trip was talking with artists at Paa Ya Paa, a retreat center. Other field trips included Pokot Mission at Langat, Turkana, Rift Valley and Masai Mara.

First introduced in 1986, the program has allowed 44 students to travel to Africa. Students participating in the African Studies Program, which takes place during the spring semester, earn a total of 16 credits for a full semester's work. The program is designed to fulfill the academic requirements of Salve Regina College. The students who went to Africa last spring were required to take a course in Swahili before and during the semester, which enabled them to gain conversational skills.

The new European Studies Program is designed to help students understand the culture and economy of contemporary Western Europe. Professors from Irish colleges, working with Fr. John Meade, of Salve Regina College, and Dr. Andrew Burke, of St. Patrick's College, Dublin, teach the courses. Students earn 16 credits while concentrating their studies on the European economic community.

The European Studies Program requires weekend field trips through Ireland. The 11 students who went to Ireland in September embarked on a two-week tour throughout Europe. They visited London, Brussels, Strasbourg, Luxembourg, Cologne and Paris, cities of great importance to the development of the European economic community.

One of the courses students take while in Ireland explores the achievements of Modern Anglo-Irish writers such as Joyce, Yeats, O'Casey, Synge, and Kavanagh. As part of this course, students travel to Yeats country and visit homes of other well-known writers.

Alumna Volunteers for Earthquake Effort

Mary Beth Hanley (1985) joined a health care team that traveled to Soviet Armenia to provide assistance to earthquake victims last spring.

AmeriCares, a Connecticut-based international relief group, was the first to send aid to Armenia following the Dec. 7, 1988 earthquake. The group's goals were to bring Armenian patients to the United States for treatment and to establish an artificial limbs and braces clinic in Armenia. The clinic is the first project of AmeriCares' volunteer program, DOCTORS TO ALL PEOPLES (DTAP). The goal of DTAP is to help educate health professionals in Armenia so they can maintain the AmeriCares' clinic in the future.

Hanley, an emergency room nurse at St. Francis Hospital and Medical Center, Hartford, Connecticut, joined nurses and physicians from both Connecticut and Colorado as they made up the second group of health professionals to go to Armenia on AmeriCares' behalf. The group relieved physicians, nurses and other health personnel who arrived in Armenia to establish the clinic in March. Several groups of AmeriCares' volunteer health

professionals will staff the Armenia clinic on a rotation basis.

Mary Beth credits her education at Salve Regina College as an inspiration for her desire to be of service to others. "An experience like this makes you very proud to be a nurse and every time I looked down at my left ring finger and saw my Salve Regina ring, I would wonder what my instructors would say if they saw me now! If it were not for all of you, I would not have been able to do this."

While in Armenia, Hanley had the opportunity to meet Mother Teresa and says, "I truly felt as if I was in the presence of a saint." Among the difficulties encountered in the midst of earthquake damage, Mary Beth found the scarcity of supplies a challenge. "We ran out of dressings, medications, etcetera, but we did the best with what we had." Hanley says that going to Armenia gave her the chance to have the most gratifying experience any nurse could ever hope for—to be needed, wanted and respected for her skills, judgement and clinical expertise.

Mary Beth is currently enrolled in anesthesia school at the Hospital of St. Raphael in New Haven, Connecticut. Also, she is a Second Lieutenant in the Army Reserves.

SRC Director of Athletics is First Woman Inducted into PC Hall of Fame



Lynn Sheedy, Director of Athletics at Salve Regina College, was the first woman athlete inducted into the Providence College Hall of Fame at an awards ceremony held on Feb. 2. The inductees, nine in all, were honored at a dinner held at Raymond Hall on the PC campus on Feb. 2, and they were presented at halftime ceremonies during Providence's basketball game against Connecticut on Feb. 3.

Sheedy assumed the Director of Athletics post at Salve Regina in 1988, and she served as Assistant Dean of Students and basketball coach at Salve Regina from 1986-1988. She was head coach of the women's basketball team at Providence College from 1983-1985.

While a student at PC, Sheedy led the Lady Friars to an 82-27 record in her four years, was captain of the field-hockey team and was a starting outfielder for the softball team. She was selected as the college's female athlete of the year in 1979.

Regarded as one of the finest woman athletes in the state, Sheedy finished her stint with the Lady Friars as the all-time PC leader in points (1,261) and assists (571).



Taking Social Work From the Classroom to the Field

Mary Montminy-Danna, Assistant Professor of Social Work, sits behind her somewhat cluttered desk, quietly sipping a large mug of herbal tea. With her soft-spoken, cheery voice, she shares observations gleaned through her work as a counselor at the Women's Resource Center in Newport.

The Women's Resource Center of Newport County, which has been in operation for the past 10 years, works with mothers and their children who are victims of domestic violence. The Center serves the county of Newport, which includes Middletown, Jamestown, Newport, Portsmouth, Tiverton and Little Compton.

The majority of mothers and children come from middle-class homes. They seek help from the Center, either on their own or through the suggestion of a friend or family member.

The Center provides services at charge for mothers and their children through funding from each of the towns. Government grants, fund raising activities and private donations also help keep the Center in operation.

Mary, who has been with the Center for three years, works with a Salve Regina College senior, and they specifically focus their work on children who witness domestic violence. For eight to ten weeks they meet every Saturday morning for about an hour and a half, with a small group of youngsters. Presently, they are working with boys and girls between the ages of four and six.

Mary selects a topic for each session along with appropriate activities. She then counsels the children during the group session.

Recently the topic was, how can children get help when they feel that they are in danger? The activity involved making a telephone out of construction paper on which they wrote their phone numbers and 911. At other times, they might view a video or discuss a hypothetical situation in the home. Activities vary depending on the age of the children.

Mary explained that it is often a difficult task to get the younger kids to speak openly about problems, and, because of this, she relies heavily on their actions, such as running around the room, crying or becoming unusually quiet.

She claims that the children interact well with one another in the groups, although at times they can get restless. She illustrated this with an incident that happened in a group of older children. The group was discussing Thanksgiving and what the holiday meant to them, and one 10-year-old boy became very agitated and upset. Thanksgiving, to him, meant having Daddy throw the turkey dinner which Mommy had made on the floor.

"This time of year is very stressful for the kids," Mary explains. "They never know when the next fight is going to break out."

During group sessions, the children are expected to follow specific rules, such as no name calling or making fun of the other children. This teaches them that it is unfair to degrade and humiliate others.

In the future Mary hopes for the Center to have groups running at the same time for all ages. "For this we need more help and more trained people, but it is our goal."

Salve Regina College Will Host High School Chamber Music Festival

The fifth annual High School Chamber Music Festival will take place on Saturday, March 10 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. in Ochre Court at Salve Regina College. High school students from Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island will perform chamber music and instrumental and group vocal selections. The students will be coached by college music instructors and professional musicians.

Students will have the unique opportunity to hear and perform for other high school chamber groups. They will also receive a certificate and a written critique from their evaluator, and they will have the chance to discuss their performance with them.

Ward Abusamra, who has retired from a position as Choral Director at the University of Rhode Island, will serve as an evaluator with John Molinari, a professional trombonist and retired music educator from Wellsville, N.Y.

Her experiences, which she chronicled in an article published in **The Downeast Coastal Press**, a weekly paper in Maine, included a study of Irish cultural life and excursions to Wales and the English countryside. In addition to the European and African programs, both sponsored by Salve Regina, students also have an opportunity to join study programs in other European countries.

Lizabeth Dion, an art major with a concentration in communication design, went to Florence, Italy last spring. "I have always admired the great Renaissance masters Leonardo, Michelangelo and Raphael," Lizabeth explains. "The opportunity to study and live in a city so historically and artistically awe-inspiring was the main reason I chose Florence."

Sue Kaminsky studied in Siena and in Florence. She is an art major with a concentration in photography. She says of her experience, "The independence I gained was the dependence I lost. No longer am I timid to express myself; no longer am I timid to stand alone in my opinion. The willingness I gained was the willingness to accept a culture without thinking it was bizarre."

Jason Burrell spent last year studying at Parsons School of Design in Paris. Melissa Ablondi studied at Richmond College in London, England.

Salve Regina College presents an O'Donnell Scholarship award to one student each year at Honors Convocation. It includes a full year's tuition at Trinity and All Saints College, Leeds, England. Nine students have won this prestigious award since it was first introduced in 1981. The O'Donnell Scholarship, based on academic standing at the College, was granted to Betsy Burrell, an English/communications major, for the current semester.

Brothers of the Christian Schools Honored

The Brothers of the Christian Schools (FSC) have been honored twice this year by special recognition of their vocation within the Church. In May of 1989, Pope John Paul II beatified one of their members who has spent his life catechizing former slaves on the Island of Reunion, off the coast of Africa. This brother, who was given the name of Brother Scubillion when he entered the congregation, was born in France but died on the Island of Reunion.

On December 10, 1989, the Pope canonized another brother. He is Brother Mutian-Marie, a Belgian who spent his life teaching art and music and supervising boarders at a large school in Malonne, Belgium.

Both of these men represent aspects of the vocation of the Brothers of the Christian Schools: teaching, and in particular, teaching religion, all from a motivation of faith.

The Brothers of the Christian Schools—or Christian Brothers—have eight brothers on the faculty at Salve Regina, and two brothers enrolled as full-time students.
