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

Salve Regina Introduces Two New 5-Year Master of Science Degree Programs

This September, Salve Regina
College will launch two, new five-year
programs of study which will grant
combined bachelor's and master's
degrees. The new programs are in
accounting and biomedical
technology and management.

Master's Program in Biomedical Technology and Management

The new graduate program in biomedical technology and management interfaces with our undergraduate program in biology with a specialization in microbiology. In a five-year combined bachelor's and master's program, students can earn a bachelor of science in biology with a microbiology specialization and a master of science degree in biomedical technology and management.

"This new program is designed to prepare graduates for professional careers in medical technology and biotechnology," said Dr. Mary Louise Greeley, the program director. "The program qualifies students for entrance to the national registration examination given by the American Society of Clinical Pathologists (ASCP). Satisfactory completion of the exam enables the student to become a registered medical technologist."

The management segment of this program prepares the student to assume a leadership position in the biomedical technology field, according to Dr. Greeley. The typical position in a laboratory not only requires biology or biomedical graduate and undergraduate degrees, she said, but also advanced management courses.

Master's Program in Accounting

In the combined bachelor and master degree program in accounting, students can earn either a bachelor of arts or bachelor of science as well as a master of science degree in accounting.

The new 5-year program is particularly suited to students who wish to get an undergraduate degree in liberal arts and an advanced degree in business. This powerful combination is highly desirable to employers seeking graduates with a well-rounded professional education, according to recent trends reported by the American Institute of Certified

Public Accountants.

Following the suggested plan of study, the student will complete all of the undergraduate and one-fifth of the graduate requirements by the end of the fourth year.

The program meets all the requirements necessary to sit for the national CPA examination as well as new membership requirements issued by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants.



Art Department Chairman at Salve Regina College Named President of National Ceramics Organization

A professor at Salve Regina College has been appointed as president of a national arts education association and has been selected as an artist-in-residence at an internationally renowned ceramic center.

Jay Lacouture, Chairman of the Art Department at Salve Regina, has been named President of the National Council on Education for the Ceramic Arts (NCECA). Lacouture assumed the post of NCECA president during the recent national meeting of the organization, held in Cincinnati. The office involves a six-year tenure, two as president-elect, two as president and two as past-president. He will preside over the next two national conferences, including the 25th anniversary meeting of NCECA which will be held in Tempe, Arizona next spring.

NCECA, a non-profit educational

organization, is a professional association of individuals whose interests, talents or careers focus primarily on the ceramic arts. It became an independent organization in 1967 after several years of affiliation with the Ceramic Educational Council of the American Ceramic Society. Members include teachers, artists, potters, students and others who share a concern for the ceramic arts.

While on sabbatical this fall, Lacouture will be an artist-in-residence at the Archie Bray Foundation in Helena, Montana. The Archie Bray Foundation, a public, non-profit educational foundation dedicated to the enrichment of the ceramic arts, was founded in 1951 with the intention of providing a workplace for artists concentrating on the ceramic arts. Artists-in-residence are chosen from an internationally competitive field of applicants.

A graduate of Rhode Island College, Lacouture received his M.F.A. in ceramics at West Virginia University. He was appointed to the Salve Regina College faculty in 1980 and has served as chairman since 1981. His work has been exhibited nationally in cities which include New York, Kansas City, Portland, Ore., San Antonio and Los Angeles.

In Memoriam



Mr. James L. Maher, a former member of the College's Board of Trustees and recipient of an honorary doctoral degree from the College, died on March 27. He was 82. Among his many accomplishments, Mr. Maher was instrumental in establishing the first Salve Regina College Governor's Ball. He also added to the Ball's continued success in the years following. In addition, Mr. Maher established the first group home for mentally handicapped citizens in Rhode Island. He founded three centers providing educational or developmental programs for the mentally handicapped on Aquidneck Island: the James L. Maher Center, James L. Maher Hall and the James L. Maher Vocational Rehabilitation Center. He served as Newport's mayor from 1959 until 1961 and was a member of the Newport City Council from 1953 to 1955.

In order to qualify for acceptance into the program, a student is first required to have an undergraduate biology degree with a specialization in microbiology or biochemistry. Professionals who would qualify include students with degrees in the following areas: pharmacy, marine biology, nursing and chemistry. (The biology credits must have been taken within the last five years.) Additionally, acceptance into the program is contingent upon the student being accepted into a medical technology internship at one of the College's affiliated hospitals or into an approved medical technology internship at a hospital with which the College would open an affiliation. Prospective students should contact the medical technology program director concerning the specific requirements for admission to the internship. Contact Dr. Greeley at ext. 3105.

The master of science degree in biomedical technology and management is granted upon completion of a program of at least 47 hours of credit. The students' program of study consists of a 32 credit medical technology internship and five graduate courses (15 credits) in management. The internship is normally begun in June-September and is completed at an affiliated hospital-based school which is approved by the American Society of Clinical Pathologists.

The 32 credits include clinical laboratory techniques, clinical microbiology, clinical chemistry, hematology and coagulation, clinical microscopy and the medical technology hospital elective. The 15 credits include organizational theory and behavior, management of human resources, financial accounting, marketing management, ethics for managers: theory and practice, financial management and business policy.

The trend today for professionals in these technical fields is to eventually pursue a master's degree or a doctorate in such biotechnical areas as biochemistry, immunology or microbiology, according to Dr. Greeley. "They have to if they want to move up in management," she said. "A master's makes a student more versatile and desirable from an employer's perspective."

"These conclusions were arrived at after polling many of our biomedical technology graduates who have gone on in the field. Most said that a combination of a master's program in medical technology and management would be the best offering. We hope to address this need and, in doing so, provide the public with a properly educated medical technologist."

Additionally, Salve Regina College intends to maintain its long-standing undergraduate program in medical technology.
