LECTURE ON EXISTENTIALISM
SLATED IN SALVE SERIES

Guillemine de Vitry de la Coste, associate professor of Philosophy at Newton (Mass.) College of the Sacred Heart, will deliver the fourth Mother Hilda Miley Memorial Lecture at Salve Regina College, Tuesday, December 6 at 7:30 p.m. in Ochre Court. Her subject: French Existential Drama--from objectivism to intersubjectivism. The public is invited.

In her lecture, Mme. de la Coste will discuss and compare the plays of Jean-Paul Sartre and Gabriel Marcel from the point of view of their philosophical meaning.

At Newton since 1956, she is a recognized scholar in the field of existential philosophy having addressed such associations as the Realist Society, the American Catholic Association and the Metaphysical Society.

An associate of the noted French philosopher and dramatist Gabriel Marcel, Mm. de la Coste was in close collaboration with him while pursuing her doctorate in philosophy at the University of Paris on a Fulbright grant.

An open discussion will follow the presentation.
