**TWENTY-TWO SALVE REGINA FACULTY MEMBERS  
TO TEACH OR STUDY OFF-CAMPUS THIS SUMMER**

Twenty-two members of the Salve Regina

College faculty will teach or study off-campus during the summer, it was announced (6/10/66) by Sister Mary Rosalia, R.S.M., dean.

Fifteen members of the staff will teach in

the 1966 Salve Regina Summer Session, and seventeen visiting professors will be on campus for that session, which will offer fourteen courses in Science, Education, Languages, History, Music, Philosophy, American Constitutional Law, and Theology; a Reading Practicum; a five-course program in Special Education; a Drama Workshop with Ethel Barrymore Colt as actress in residence; and a Pre-College Study Skills program.

Sister Mary Augustine, R.S.M., head of the

College's Division of Nursing, will be the official delegate of the R.I. State Nurses' Association (of which she is president) to the American Nurses' Association Biennial Convention in San Francisco, June 10-18. Following this, she will participate in an inter-university faculty workshop at Chatham, Mass., June 19-24. She will then go to Honduras, Central America, as a consultant to Sister Mary Ellenice, R.S.M., who is organizing a baccalaureate program in nursing at the National University at Tegucigalpa, the capital of Honduras.

Miss Lucille Sullivan of the Division of Nurs-

ing will accompany Sister Mary Augustine to San Francisco, Chatham, and Honduras.

Also from the Division of Nursing, Sister Mary Rosarita, R.S.M., will attend the workshop in Chatham and then go to Teachers College, Columbia University, N.Y.C., to continue her graduate study and coursework. Dr. Ascanio DiPippo, Associate Professor of Chemistry, will be a visiting professor at Slippery Rock State College, Pennsylvania. Sister Marie Lizette of the Physics Department will continue her graduate work at the University of Pennsylvania in the field of computer programming and analysis.

In the language area, Sister Mary Ignatius, R.S.M., of Salve's Spanish Department, will go to La Cieba, Honduras, to teach in the high school there and help the students organize a student council. Mrs. Georgette Ramos of the French Department will travel and study in France and also travel with her family to the Near East. From the same department, Sister Mary Jeremy, R.S.M., will continue her doctoral program at Fordham University.
