FOLK SINGER
SET AT SALVE

The Folk Music Society of Salve Regina college will sponsor the next event in Cultural Series/1966 with the appearance of Jesuit folk singer Paul Quinlan, Wednesday, at 7:30 in Ochre Court. The public is welcome. Donation: 75¢.

A favorite at the college where he has made frequent informal calls and a nationally known recording artist, Mr. Quinlan has been described as one whose art is "an open-hearted response to the psalmist's invitation to "make a joyful noise unto the Lord." "

Mr. Quinlan's program will consist of folk songs and ballads with a special concentration on his unique contribution to American sacred folk music, the "folk psalm." In these, he is concerned primarily about handing on the word of God -- "God's joyous message of Salvation" -- in song.

Presently an instructor at Holy Cross college, Worcester, Mass., Mr. Quinlan comes from a family of folk singers and dancers and was early initiated into his exciting medium. After graduating from Dartmouth in 1960, he began his Jesuit course of studies.
