Sister Maureen Dietz, R.S.M., faculty member of the Science Education Department at Salve Regina College, Newport, R. I., recently received a Doctoral Degree in Science at the University of Pennsylvania. After completing her B.S. at Creighton University, Sister Maureen Dietz continued her education at the University of Pennsylvania where she received an N.S.F. Fellowship, a Teaching-Research Fellowship and an N.S.F. Faculty Grant. Her research in problem solving in collaboration with Dr. Kenneth George has resulted in the Problem Solving Skills Test which is currently being considered for publication by Educational Testing Service of Princeton University. She initiated the Graduate Students Association of the Graduate School of Education at the University of Pennsylvania and served for three years as its first president. As science consultant, she worked in Suburban Philadelphia, the Haverford Elementary School District and Educational T.V. Articles co-authored with Dr. Kenneth George have been published in Science Education and the Journal of Research in Science Teaching. Sister Maureen Dietz did a series of filmstrips for Dateline: Science.
