Five Spanish scholars and two faculty members were initiated into Sigma Delta Pi, national Spanish Honor Society, in a candlelight ceremony in Ochre Court. The new members included Mary Frances Amodeo; Catherine Ann Augenthaler; Sister Felisa Perez; Mrs. Judith Grace Grieve; and Mrs. Helen Jane Czepiel. Reverend Christopher Johnson, College chaplain, and Sister Norma Orme, a member of the Spanish department, received associate memberships. Chairman of the planning committee for the ceremony was Dr. Heriberto Vazquez, associate professor of Spanish and director of Spanish studies.

Dr. E. William Burrell, associate professor of English and education and chairman of the education department, has been elected 84th president of the Barnard Club, an organization of male college and secondary school teachers and administrators.

Miss Susan Gilmartin '74 was selected as Rhode Island's "princess" to represent the state in the annual Cherry Blossom Festival, held in Washington, D. C.

APPOINTMENTS

Dr. Lester Carr, vice president for academic affairs, has been named sixth president of Lewis College, Lockport, Illinois, a coeducational college of arts and sciences with a full-time enrollment of 2,300 students. He will begin his presidency there on August 1.

C. Edward O'Loughlin, dean of continuing education, will leave the College in June to begin a new assignment as associate director of the Evening College at Elmira (N. Y.), a coeducational college with 1,300 students in the day school and 1,600 in the Evening College.

Edward Richie Van Vliet, assistant professor of foreign languages, has been appointed assistant professor of French and linguistics at Elizabethtown College, Pennsylvania, a private coeducational college with 1,500 students.

Some 100 parents of Salve Regina students were on campus for the first Parents Weekend, which was conducted by the Student Nurse Organization. The parents and daughters participated in a round of activities beginning with a registration social and ending with a Mass and brunch. In the interim there were Newport and campus tours, a buffet luncheon, boat rides, dialogues, and a dinner party at the Viking Hotel. Chairman of the Weekend was Roberta Sutherland '71.

A highlight of Parents Weekend was a "Pops Concert" of the College's glee club under the direction of Glenn Giuttari, instructor in creative arts. The 45-voice chorus demonstrated their virtuosity with renditions of spiritual, contemporary rock and romantic, and operatic music. The concert also featured the "Fanny Allen Sisters" - a harmony ensemble - and a semi-staging of the long-run Broadway hit, "Fiddler On The Roof" directed by Miss Joan David, assistant professor of English and dramatics.

Naval War College students and members of the younger generation met in seminar groups at the College to discuss "Vietnam, Cambodia, and Global Involvement." The program concluded a six-part series on "Current Attitudes" sponsored by the War College. The series--which involved undergraduates from Salve Regina, Brown University, Pembroke College, and the University of Rhode Island, as well as Naval Officer Candidates and junior officers--covered a wide range of contemporary topics.

Charles E. Goodell, former Republican senator--who was defeated last year by Conservative James Buckley--addressed an audience of 250 persons in the Twombly-Burden Room on the question: "Will Nixon Survive in '72?" The address concluded the 1970-71 series which was under the chairmanship of Maryclare Johnson '72.

Six music students presented in recital by the creative arts department this spring were Sister Janet Marie Blank '74, voice; Jane Foley '71, French Horn; and Sheila Foy '74, Susan Lyons '72, Katie Norton '74, and Angela Reo '73 piano. Their selections--many accompanied by Sister Marianne Postiglione, instructor and director of music, and Mr. Glenn Giuttari--included works by Schubert, Bach, Mozart, Chopin, and Haydn.

The division of modern languages sponsored its annual International Festival, the purpose of which was to bring together the members of the College community in an atmosphere of mutual appreciation of the cultures represented. Among the activities of the evening were a buffet of native dishes and a skit about modern-day Paris.

Sister Mary Christopher, president, addressed a dinner meeting of the Fall River Branch of the American Association of University Women, at the Viking Hotel.

Dr. Lester Carr was a guest speaker for the State Department of Community Affairs at a conference on psychological problems of housing authorities and tenants.

Mrs. Georgette Ramos, professor of foreign languages and director of French studies, recently attended a meeting of the Federation of Alliance Francaise, in Barrington.

Dr. Ascanio G. DePippo, professor of chemistry and chairman of the department, served as a judge at the Eastern Massachusetts Science Fair, in Fall River... Dr. DiPippo continues his work as an emergency translator in Italian for FISH, an ecumenical movement in Newport.

Dr. E. William Burrell attended a conference on humanities education, sponsored by the Boston University School of Education. The purpose of the conference was to enhance the sharing of ideas and experiences relative to humanities education on the elementary, secondary, and college levels.

Reverend Richard E. Mandeville, instructor in theology, was a witness before the U. S. Senate Sub-committee on Higher Education discussing "Higher Education and the Future," in Washington, D. C.

Mr. W. James Hersh, instructor in philosophy, spoke on "Oriental Mythology As It Relates to Western Mythology" at the Unitarian Meeting House, in Ridgefield, Connecticut.

Sr. Marie Corinne Walsh, assistant professor of education and director of elementary education, and Sr. Joan McInnis, instructor in education and mathematics, and Dr. Burrell accompanied students to Newton, Massachusetts for on-site observations of schools. The trip was co-sponsored by the College's chapter of the Student National Education Association and the education department.

Mr. Robert J. McKenna, assistant professor of political science, on two recent occasions, addressed the Newport Taxpayers Association at the Viking Hotel, and the Barnard Club at the University of Rhode Island, on the topic of "The Extended School Year." Mr. McKenna, a state legislator, is chairman of a special legislative committee studying year-round schools.
