IRISH FORTNIGHT CULMINATES

The last in a series of lectures which comprise the "Irish Fortnight," a group of talks on Irish culture, will take place at Salve Regina College on Saturday, March 30 with a lecture by Dr. Michael Herity. Dr. Herity, an expert on the Irish Stone Age, will speak on "Irish Gold -- A Magnet for Colonization." The lecture will begin at 8:00 p. m. in Ochre Court. Admission is free.

Before becoming a lecturer in Celtic Archaeology at University College, Dr. Herity worked as a teacher and a radio and television newscaster on Radio-Telefís Eircarn. His publications have appeared in the Journal of the Royal Society of Antiquaries of Ireland, the Ulster Journal of Archaeology, and the Irish University Review. His book, Irish Passage Graves, which will be published in spring, 1974, describes the civilization that built the magnificent Byrne Valley Tombs, New Grange, Knowth and Dowth in about 2500 B. C.
