Record Enrollment at Salve Regina College

A total of 1,730 students are taking courses at Salve Regina College this fall,

the largest number in the College's history. Three hundred and seventy students,

lie men and 254 women, are enrolled as freshmen. The rest of the undergraduate student body is comprised of 502 men and 709 women, and a total of 149 students are enrolled in graduate courses. The college offers a graduate program leading to a Master of Arts degree in Human Development. The majority of students attending Salve Regina are from the New England and Middle Atlantic States. Roughly one-fifth of them live on campus.

College President, Sister Lucille McKillop, R.S.M., attributes the school's growing enrollment to "realization on the part of the Newport County Community that Salve Reg ina College is here to respond to the educational needs of the community; to the dedication of personnel within the college to the concept that this Catholic college exists to help raise each man and woman, and the community, to the highest cultural level attainable; and to the readiness of its personnel to face new challenges

at a time when the needs of the present are new needs for new persons looking toward a different future."

Approximately 180 graduate and undergraduate courses in the liberal arts, criminal justice, management, nursing and medical technology are being offered by the college this fall. Classes began September 8th.
