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### "Archetypal Images in the Modern World" is Subject of Free Lecture at Salve Regina - The Newport College

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"ARCHETYPAL IMAGES IN THE MODERN WORLD" IS SUBJECT OF

"Archetypal Images in the Modern World," is the subject of a lecture by Diana Lee James to be presented at 8 p.m. Monday, April 26 at Salve Regina - The Newport College. The lecture, free and open to the public, will be held in the auditorium of O'Hare Academic Center, Ochre Point Ave.

James' lecture will include a discussion of how the archetype, the original pattern or model after which a thing is made, has appeared in ancient religions, writings and works of art. Subsequently, via the unconscious, it reappears in cultures such as our own, thousand of years later.

One ancient archetype, for example, who has been discovered

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in similar form in all cultures throughout history, is the hero. The Greek hero Perseus, with his sense of honor, justice and duty can still be found today via the creation of Luke Skywalker of "Star Wars" fame.

James will take a more in-depth look at the hero, as well as many other archetypal images in our contemporary world. A frequent lecturer on archetypal symbols and myths, James is curator for the Archive for Research in Archetypal Symbolism at the C.G. Jung Foundation in New York City, as well as being a member of the Jung Training Center faculty.
