Mr. Lieberman has addressed audiences nationwide on special education issues. A college professor, he is also associate editor of the Journal of Learning Disabilities. Issues discussed on October 6 at Salve will be of particular interest to teachers and parents. The lecture is free.

### ILLEGAL PARKING

The Newport Police Department has informed the college Security Office that many cars are being parked illegally on the streets adjacent to the college.

Cars are being parked too close to the street corner, obstructing the intersection, parking diagonally off the street on the sidewalks and parking against normal traffic flow pattern. (Left wheel to curb.)

Vehicles which are illegally parked will be ticketed by the Newport Police Department. Illegally parked cars which present a safety hazard to the community will be ticketed and towed.

### SAFETY NOTE:

Remember, personal safety is your responsibility. Streets adjacent to the college are continuously congested with parked vehicles.

Students walking in the street when going to or coming from class present a very hazardous situation.

It is also illegal to walk in or on the road in the state of Rhode Island.
