EXPLORING THE IMPACT OF TECHNOLOGY

While many of today's institutions of higher education are deeply involved in researching and developing new technology, there appear to be only a few involved in asking why we're doing it. Why more technology? For what purpose? For whose benefit? What is its impact?

Salve is one of the nation's colleges that has decided to take a closer look at advancing technology. "We're not looking for solutions," Dr. Gleiman explains. "But we are looking to increase awareness of the impact of technology. The challenge for education is to anticipate what will happen in the future."

On February 2 at 4 p.m., Dr. Pamela M. Pettinati, chief of the Division of Plastic, Reconstructive, and Maxillo-facial Surgery at St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Brighton, Mass., will examine technological developments related to health care and the health care delivery system. She believes "radical" problems exist with respect to priorities, economics and distribution. Among her questions are: "Who shoulders the burden of the cost of high technology in medicine and who receives the benefits? Are we setting priorities which favor the provision of technologic wonders and which ignore basic needs?"

This lecture series has been designated as the College's Peace and Justice Symposium.

DR. GLEIMAN, NICK NYKAZA TO APPEAR ON TV, RADIO TALK SHOWS

Dr. Lubomir Gleiman has been invited to appear on WPRI-Channel 12's show "Direct Question," airing Friday, January 28, from 10:30 to 11:00 a.m. Dr. Gleiman will be speaking on technology, the subject of this year's Peace and Justice Symposium, and will answer questions from viewers who call in. On Sunday, January 30, Dr. Gleiman can also be heard on WOTB's radio show "Coastline," at 6:30 a.m. and again at 10:00 p.m. Technology as it affects our lives, and the upcoming lecture "Technology and Medicine," will again be the topics for discussion.

On February 6, Nick Nykaza, director of financial aid, will be on "Coastline" to talk about the approaching deadline for financial aid applications, the availability of financial aid funds and the implications surrounding proposed government cutbacks in funding. Again, the program airs at 6:30 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.

JAZZ MUSICIAN CHET BAKER TO PERFORM CONCERT JANUARY 29 AT SALVE

Legendary jazz artist Chet Baker will appear at Salve for two performances Saturday, January 29, at 6:30 and 9:30 p.m. in Ochre Court. Also performing at the concert will be the Ted Casher Quintet and jazz vocalist Sarah Nagourney.

In the world of jazz, Baker is a traditional player considered by musicians and critics alike to be one of the best trumpet players in the history of jazz.

Ted Casher is an accomplished jazz saxophonist who has performed with jazz superstars

such as: Ella Fitzgerald, Tony Bennett, John Denver, Lou Rawls, Tony Orlando, Merv Griffin and Louis Armstrong.

Ted Casher is currently an assistant professor of music at Dean Junior College in Franklin, Mass.

Jazz vocalist Sarah Nagourney is a native of Connecticut who later moved to England and studied voice. Now appearing in Greenwich Village clubs, Nagourney has appeared at clubs all over London and last winter performed at Hong Kong's annual International Arts Festival.

NURSE SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE FOR 1983 FALL TERM

The Veterans Administration announced that it is seeking applications for its Health Professional Scholarship Program for the 1983 fall school term.

The program, authorized by Congress, provides support for baccalaureate and master nursing students on a pay-back-in-service basis. The scholarship provides tuition, educational expenses and a monthly stipend with participants agreeing to serve a minimum of two years as a full-time registered nurse in one of VA's 172 hospitals or 226 out-patient clinics.
