

O'HARE LECTURE SERIES



FULBRIGHT TEACHER EXCHANGE PROGRAM


The Teacher Exchange Program involves a one-on-one exchange for teachers at the elementary, secondary and post-secondary levels with suitable teachers overseas. The 1986-87 overseas exchange programs will involve Canada, the United Kingdom, France, The Federal Republic of Germany, Denmark, Switzerland and possibly Italy. The number of exchanges available and the eligibility vary by country.

The program also provides opportunities for teachers to participate in summer seminars from three to eight weeks in length. During the summer of 1986, seminars will be held in Italy and The Netherlands.

He is coordinating the NCECA members' Traveling Exhibit which will be in the McKillop Gallery next November. Mr. Lacouture is currently exhibiting his work at the Craft Alliance Gallery in St. Louis and the Craftsman's Gallery in Scarsdale, N.Y.

In that capacity he made an on-site visit to the Ursuline Academy in Dedham, Mass. earlier this month.

Brother Victor recently attended the New York District Chapter of the Christian Brothers as an elected delegate.

Father Eugene Hillman, Professor of Liberal Studies, has been invited by the National Conference of Catholic Bishops to help in the preparation of their pastoral statement, to be issued next year, on the Church's missionary activity. Aside from his missionary service in Africa for 23 years, Father Hillman's several scholarly books and numerous articles, published in several languages, have earned him an international reputation as a theologian of global vision. Currently Father Hillman teaches social ethics in the Graduate Degree Program in International Relations, and most of his students are middle-rank officers from the U.S. Naval War College in Newport.

Kitty Rok, Department of Special Education, recently attended a conference in Boston sponsored by the Learning Disabilities Foundation. The conference was entitled, "Frontiers of Research: Understanding the Language and Learning Disabled Child."
