GOVERNOR'S BALL SURPASSES \$100,000 FUNDRAISING GOAL

The twelfth annual Salve Regina College Governor's Ball combined festivity with successful fundraising. The gala black-tie event, held on December 3 in the gaily decorated Ochre Court, surpassed its fundraising goal of \$100,000 to generate over \$105,000 with returns still being received. Proceeds supplement the College scholarship program.

Dancers waltzed and whirled to the big band sound of the Duke Belaire orchestra, and the record turnout of nearly 600 guests generated a cozy atmosphere.

General chairpersons for the ball were Mr. and Mrs. Norman Beretta of Jamestown. Mr. Beretta owns Beretta Realty Company of Narragansett and Pawtucket, R.I. He and his wife, Joyce, are active in social and community events.

FACULTY NEWS

Sister Arlene Woods, Associate Professor of Art, has been included in Rhode Island: A Bibliography Of It's History, Volume Five.

Dr. Cheryl Beck, Assistant Professor of Nursing, has recently had an article, "Norm Setting For The Verbal Estimation Of A 40-Second Interval By Women Of Childbearing Ages," published in Perceptual and Motor Skills, 1988 Volume 67, pages 577-578.

Dr. Camille Allen, Assistant Professor of Education, has recently published an article in Computers in the School, an interdisciplinary journal of practice, theory, and applied research. Her article is entitled "Social Interactions Between a Teacher and Small Groups of Students Working with a Microcomputer."

Michael Thombs, Assistant Professor of Information Systems Science, presented a paper, Software and Courseware Design for Computer-Based Learning at the 1st-Class National Conference, November 30 - December 2 in Boston, Mass. 1st Class and 1st Class/Fusion are Expert Systems shells, a component of Artificial Intelligence (AI). This paper discussed the use of Expert Systems in Education.

Daniel Ludwig, Assistant Professor of Art, had a joint show with his wife, Anne Leone, at the Triangle Gallery in Lexington, Kentucky during September and October. The show was well reviewed in the Lexington Herald-Leader and the Woodford Country Times, and resulted in the Kentucky Museum of Art purchase of Ludwig's painting "Newport Afternoon" for their permanent collection. Ludwig is also exhibiting in the "Kentucky Print Show at the Headley Museum in Lexington. The show, organized by the Kentucky Department of the Arts, runs through December. In September, Ludwig showed two paintings at the Allan Stone Gallery in New York. The show, entitled "New Talent," highlighted the work of artists whose work is new to the New York gallery scene.
