SALVE REGINA STUDENTS IN CLEAN SWEEP AGAINST HUNGER

Students at Salve Regina College will participate in a national student campaign to clean up local neighborhoods and raise funds to ease hunger. Student volunteers will clean up a section of Newport on April 15, and the proceeds they raise through pledges will go to city and international hunger relief.

The process resembles a walk-a-thon in the sense that students will ask for pledges from individuals and businesses in return for their clean-up tasks. Half of the funds will go to a local (as yet unspecified) soup kitchen or community aid organization, and the other half will go to the National Student Campaign Against Hunger.

The national organization has sponsored four previous campaigns. Last year some 8,000 students from 109 cities raised \$100,000. A portion of those funds went to Ethiopia for plumbing and clean water facilities.

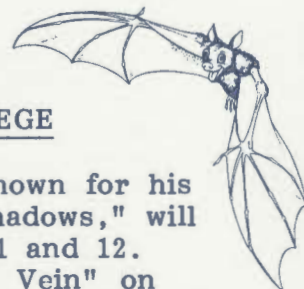

DATE SET FOR CONFIRMATION CEREMONY

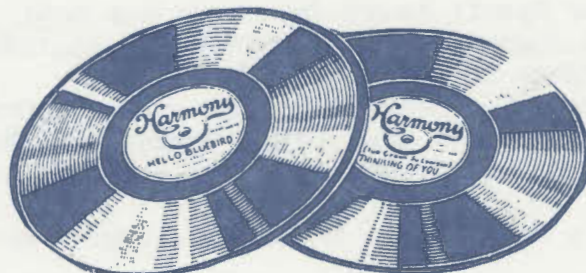

WINTER SPORTS UPDATE

The Ice Hockey team won the 1988 Regular Season Championship of the Northeast Collegiate Hockey Association (NECHA), Division II. The award is granted to the team with the best overall record in the league. Senior Jim Graiser finished second in the league with a scoring record of 18 goals and 12 assists.

Men's Basketball won the 1988-89 Commonwealth Coast Conference Championship. The team had finished the regular season in a tie with Wentworth Institute, and they broke the tie by defeating Wentworth, 74-70 on February 28.

Commonwealth Coast Conference Awards, chosen by coaches from all the league teams, went to senior Tim Grasso and coach Mike Raffa.

Women's Basketball won the 1988-89 Commonwealth Coast Conference Championship for the second consecutive year. The team had finished the season in a tie with Curry College, and they broke the tie with a 53-42 victory on February 26.

Commonwealth Coast Conference Awards went to first team players Patricia Reall and Christine Elliott, both seniors, and to Tracy Giroux, a junior. Chris Julius, a junior, won the Coach's Award and a second team award.

FACULTY NEWS

Dr. William Burrell, Vice President/Dean of Graduate Studies, has been appointed as a member of the United Way's Accountability Review Committee on Family Foundations, one of three committees in the reorganized allocations process. The purpose of the assignment is to assist the United Way in meeting its accountability responsibility to the community and the donor. The committee ensures that monies contributed through the United Way campaign are used effectively and efficiently to provide needed health and social services. Dr. Burrell has been actively involved as a volunteer in the United Way allocation process since 1977.

John Rok, Dean of Students, recently fulfilled recertification requirements of the National Board for Certified Counselors (NBCC). He has been recertified by the Board for another five year period. The NBCC was established six years ago to advance high standards in training and practice within the counseling profession. The organization grants certification to counselors who satisfy Board requirements through qualifying examinations or through involvement in professional activities, continuing education or in-service training.

On Wednesday, March 1, George L. "Andy" Andrade Jr., Director of Sports Information, was a panelist for the Community Leaders for Education Program, sponsored by the Rhode Island Department of Education and the Middletown Public Schools.

The purpose of the program was to provide an opportunity for parents and students to hear state and community leaders discuss the difficulties they had to overcome in order to achieve success.

Arthur Frankel, Professor of Psychology, coauthored a paper recently accepted for publication in the American Psychological Association's Journal of Experimental Psychology. The paper, entitled "Egotism vs. Learned Helplessness as an Explanation for the Unsolvable Problem Effect: Comment on Kofta and Sedek," continues a long-standing argument about why failure often has a deleterious effect on subsequent performance. The current paper comments on research by others designed to disentangle the two most popular explanations for the effects of failure on subsequent performance.

Maureen Lareau, Associate Professor of Nursing, will serve on the faculty of "Alzheimer's Disease: Combatting a Silent Epidemic," a conference scheduled for March 16 at the University of Rhode Island. Topics will include advances in non-drug treatments and discussions on issues effecting legislators and health care providers who face increased costs as the condition grows more prevalent.

Dr. Jane Bethune, Assistant Professor of Spanish, and Dr. Katherine Leary, Assistant Professor of French, recently attended a one-day workshop at Brandeis University. The workshop, "How to Use Improvisational Techniques and Role Playing in the Teaching of Foreign Languages," was conducted by Israeli actor and director, Aviel Hadari. A professor of Theatre in Education at the University of Tel Aviv, Hadari has also taught Theatre in Foreign Language classes at Brandeis University and the University of Michigan.

Dr. Mary Louise Greeley, Chairman of the Biology and Biomedical Science Department, recently attended a Microbiology Workshop sponsored by the Northeast Association for Clinical Microbiology and Infectious Disease (NACMID) and presented by faculty from Tufts Medical/Veterinary School. Topics discussed included the growing problems with Lyme Disease and the predicted increase in the number of transmissions of Eastern Equine Encephalitis to humans in the Southeastern Massachusetts/Rhode Island areas for this coming summer.
